Residents of the Weston Mount Dennis and Trethewey community now have access to seamless health and social services at the Jane Street Hub. The new centre is the result of a creative partnership between Macaulay, Unison Health and Community Services, COSTI Immigrant Services, Midaynta Community Services, North York Community House and Yorktown Family Services. In early October, we relocated our Trethewey Ontario Early Years Centre to a bright, wellequipped room in the Hub. The OEYC participants are enthusiastic about the new multi-service centre. One young mother said, "I came here for my son but I am also planning to get some health information for my father." This creative partnership will help families get better access to a wide range of free community services under one roof.







Literacy is a key pillar of children's success and self-esteem. Last year, through the Hazel Macaulay Literacy Fund, Macaulay provided much-needed support to children at risk of falling behind.

Children's Libraries were set up in nontraditional places like barbershops and community programs—so that children and parents can access high quality, culturally appropriate children's literature.

Getting Ready for School Backpacks were filled with school supplies and distributed to low-income school-age children so they could start school on an even playing field.

Literacy through the Arts engaged students in dramatic activities that increase skills, self confidence and social skills. Previously disinterested students became excited learners.
