

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2016 was a remarkable year at Macaulay.

Our programs and services continued to thrive as staff and board brought our strategic plan to life. In practice, this meant solidifying our funding, developing new collaborations, and searching out ways to put the "child and family at the centre" of all our services, practices and policies.

We consulted our service users and reviewed the research in order to better understand community needs and potential solutions. We were reminded, time and again, about the barriers so many of our families face in accessing supports for their children and for themselves. (See page 5 and 6 of this Annual Report).

In response, Macaulay is growing our efforts to provide comprehensive, seamless supports to those most in need. Our approach includes:

- Internal collaborations: Macaulay programs work together in unique ways to deliver a more holistic, comprehensive service. Example: attaching social work supports to child care centres and Homework Clubs.
- Community collaborations: We engage other service providers in order to fill service gaps. Example: Early Identification and Health Screening Clinics were held in collaboration with other health and child development services.
- Co-location: Macaulay services are delivered in shared spaces to facilitate
 access for busy families. Example: speech and language interventions are
 held in early years' centres to reduce stigma and barriers to access.
- Advocacy: Macaulay supports and partners with parents who advocate for improved services. We advocate for social policies that are "family friendly" and foster equity and inclusion.

This work will continue as we develop innovative ways to deepen our impact on the lives of children and families.

In 2016, significant change was everywhere. We congratulate all our staff and volunteers for their resilience, vision and patience during challenging times. While some of the changes are still in process, one is now confirmed. Macaulay is proud to have been selected by the United Way to be an anchoring agency. Their confidence in our organization is gratifying and will enable us to make further progress on our mission.

Thank You

All of our accomplishments in 2016 were the result of our exceptionally talented and committed team of staff, providers and volunteers. We are enormously grateful to these individuals; their depth of knowledge and caring spirit had a positive impact on more than 7.000 children and families.

We also acknowledge the tremendous dedication of our Board of Directors; their insight and leadership were a key factor in our successful year and our excitement about the future.

We especially appreciate our government and private sector partners, for their generous support and confidence in our work, and our community partners who collaborated with us for the benefit of children.

ABOUT MACAULAY

Macaulay offers a full continuum of programs and services that nurture healthy child development and build strong families and communities.

For Children and Youth

Licensed child care for children ages 0-12. Play based curriculum builds self-esteem, fosters children's natural eagerness to learn, and promotes skills development.

Licensed home child care for children ages 0-12. Caregivers offer enriched family settings that meet government standards for quality and safety.

Homework Clubs is a free program that offers a unique blend of physical activity, academic and social support for children ages 7-10 years in high need communities.

Youth Development Program offers youth from high need neighbourhoods the opportunity to serve as peer mentors in Macaulay programs.

For Families

Early Years Centres for children ages 0-6 and their parent/caregiver, strengthen families and enable preschool children to develop skills needed for healthy development and successful school entry. Specialized programs target young parents and families with children with special needs.

Healthy Babies Healthy Children provides home visits for high need families with children 0-3 years to help reduce isolation and strengthen parenting skills.

Specialized Parenting Supports offer innovative group programs that strengthen the parenting skills of our diverse communities. Individual sessions address stressors impacting family well-being.

For Children with **Special Needs**

Early Identification screens children and addresses individual needs in order to minimize the long term impact of a special need.

Early Abilities - Preschool Speech and Language Services provides assessment, treatment and parent education.

Every Child Belongs - through consultation services and professional development, Macaulay enables child care programs in the community to effectively address the needs of children with special needs.

For Vibrant Communities

Community Development initiatives like More Than a Haircut and Parent Advocacy Training strengthen our community's ability to foster healthy child development. As the lead for Program Without Walls, we facilitate community networks and coordinate the delivery of early years services by 6 community agencies. Early Literacy Specialists promote and strengthen literacy-rich programming in early years settings across Toronto.

Our Community Concerns

When issues and concerns arise in young children, early identification and intervention is critical for their long term success.

We fostered healthy child development in the following ways:

- Our 6 child care centres adopted the Primary Caregiver model, a wellresearched approach to increasing young children's emotional well-being.
- 120 home child care providers were supported to deliver care that meets the highest standards of quality.
- Validated curricula, like Second Step, Wings of Discovery, STEAM, and RIRO were used to increase social, emotional and cognitive development.
- Early Literacy Specialists provided training and evidence-based programming to 698 early years professionals and 3,874 parents/ caregivers in order for pre-school children to access language-rich learning opportunities.
- 2,764 parents and caregivers and their children attended early years centres that foster positive parent-child relationships."

Our Response:

We Fostered Healthy Child Development







We lessened the impact of risk factors in the following ways:

- 1,722 home visits were made to at-risk families in need of parenting and child development supports.
- "Kidz Reading Corners" were set up in 2 Eglinton Barbershops by More than a Haircut.
- 1,300 children with a language or speech delay received the intervention they need.
- Free after-school homework clubs were offered in 4 low income neighbourhoods.

- 252 students received support to succeed in school and in life through a comprehensive focus on homework, social skills and physical activity.
- Nutritious food was provided to children on a daily basis.
- 1,000 books a month were given to children in Macaulay programs.
- 4 early identification and screening clinics were organized with community partners to catch children in need of specialized supports and mitigate the long-term effects of special needs.

Our Response:

We Lessened the Impact of Risk Factors





We increased access to services and supports in the following ways:

- 52 fathering sessions were held right in African-Canadian Barbershops, reaching dads in innovative new ways.
- Individual social work sessions enabled parents to better access community resources (housing, financial, special needs, immigration).
- Parenting groups were delivered at child care centres and Homework Clubs to facilitate access.
- Special Needs Resource Consultants worked with 30 child care agencies to increase their ability to serve children with special needs.
- At parent advocacy workshops, parents learned to effectively navigate a confusing service system and be a strong voice for their children.
- Macaulay partnered with 91 agencies to bring families comprehensive service; for example, we collaborated with public health and a community health centre to deliver a continuum of services to pregnant and parenting youth.
- Two unique Macaulay manuals were made available on our website to enhance the quality of early learning programs across Toronto.
