






# Activities for Toddler Children

<p data-bbox="182 363 483 396"><b>Ice Age Evacuation</b></p> <p data-bbox="94 461 548 846">Have your child fill up a plastic box or large bowl with water and add some food colouring. Then add some plastic fish or any other sea creatures you may have at home. Then put the bowl or box in the freezer overnight. The next day your child watch the ice melt while manipulating with the sea animals.</p> 	<p data-bbox="720 363 943 396"><b>Decorative Jar</b></p> <p data-bbox="594 461 1064 808">Together with your child tear up various coloured paper you may have around the house, for example: construction paper, tissue paper or even wrapping paper. Encourage your child to squeeze glue on to the paper and place it on a plastic jar (use hand over hand assistance if needed).</p> 	<p data-bbox="1217 363 1446 396"><b>Who's Hiding?</b></p> <p data-bbox="1096 461 1567 894">Look for 5-10 various items around your house (but don't let your child see what items they are). Place all the items on the floor and cover them with a blanket. Ask your child to pick an item from under the blanket without peeking at the rest. While they are picking the item, you can sing "somebody's hiding, somebody's hiding, who could it be?"</p>  	<p data-bbox="1749 363 1929 396"><b>Bubble Fun</b></p> <p data-bbox="1588 444 2093 862">Together with your child pour ¼ cup of sugar in a bowl. Add two cups of water to it and mix well. Then add ¼ of dish soap and mix gently. To make a bubble wand use a chopstick or a small stick you may have laying around and a pipe cleaner. Then make a circle out of the pipe cleaner and tape it to the tip of the stick.</p> <p data-bbox="1596 911 2085 1094">If you don't have those materials at home to make a bubble wand then add try using funnels, small jugs, toy boats or any other various items your child might want to add.</p> 	<p data-bbox="2233 363 2448 396"><b>Stacking Cups</b></p> <p data-bbox="2118 461 2561 878">Gather 5-10 plastic or paper cups. Number all the cups from 1-5 or 1-10. Place all the cups on a flat surface and have your child begin stacking them. This game will help you to encourage your child to practice counting an learn to recognize numbers.</p> 

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*Supervision is still required for all the activities and children should not be left unattended during these activities.*



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<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Bowling</b></p>  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Plastic water bottles any size or shapes (5 to 10 pieces)</li> <li>• Balls (any available ball you might have at home)</li> </ul> <p><b>Directions:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. You can arrange the bottles on the flat surface in triangular position or you can just line them up.</li> <li>2. Ask your child to stand in an approximate distance and throw a ball.</li> <li>4. Ask your child how many bottles fell down?</li> <li>5. Praise them by saying "Hooray!!!, Nice throw".</li> </ol>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Masking Tape Letter Painting</b></p>  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Tape</li> <li>• Any colour construction paper</li> <li>• Washable paint (any paint that's available)</li> <li>• Paint brush (If it's not available children can use their hands)</li> </ul> <p><b>Directions:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Invite whole family to participate on the activity.</li> <li>2. Make sure to cover your surface with newspaper because painting is messy.</li> <li>3. Write a letter or word using tape (ex. "love").</li> <li>4. Encourage your children to paint over the word.</li> <li>5. Leave it to dry.</li> <li>6. Once it's dry peel off the tape.</li> </ol>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Scavenger Hunt</b> (can be indoors or backyard)</p>  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Toy animals (5 to 10 or toys that are available at home)</li> </ul> <p><b>Directions:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Invite whole family playing this game.</li> <li>2. Ask your child to hide the toy first and you looked for it or vice versa (o r their siblings to hide it and help your child to find it).</li> <li>4. Ask for clues or give some clues, to assist your children to find the item (e.g., look under the ____).</li> </ol>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Hop Scotch (DIY)</b></p>  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Tape (any available tape)</li> <li>• Scissor</li> <li>• Can be done on the hardwood, laminate or carpet.</li> <li>• You can also use a cardboard or paper (encourage children to write letters, numbers on paper)</li> <li>• If you want to play in the backyard use chalk or washable paint.</li> </ul> <p><b>Directions:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Use tape and create your pattern.</li> <li>2. Make four squares and a triangle on top.</li> <li>3. Encourage older children to create their pattern.</li> <li>4. Ask children to draw, write letters and numbers.</li> <li>5. Invite your family to play the game.</li> </ol>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Nature Collage</b></p>  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Mac tac or large size of tape or glue</li> <li>• Small sticks, colored piece of paper, feathers, dry leaves (or things that available from indoors)</li> <li>• Picture of nature in magazines</li> </ul> <p><b>Directions:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Invite your children to look for small things that they can find from either indoor or outdoor.</li> <li>2. Put all the materials on the table and encourage them to stick it on paper or tape.</li> <li>3. Ask them questions while creating collage (e.g., How does it feel when you touch sticky glue?)</li> </ol>

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
