Have your child fill up a plastic box or large bowl with water and add some food colouring. Then add some plastic fish or any other sea creatures you may have at home. Then put the bowl or box in the freezer overnight. The next day your child watch the ice melt while manipulating with the sea animals.	Together with your child tear up various coloured paper you may have around the house, for example: construction paper, tissue paper or even wrapping paper. Encourage your child to squeeze glue on to the paper and place it on a plastic jar (use hand over hand assistance if needed).	Look for 5-10 various items around your house (but don't let your child see what items they are). Place all the items on the floor and cover them with a blanket. Ask your child to pick an item from under the blanket without peeking at the rest. While they are picking the item, you can sing "somebody's hiding, somebody's hiding, who could it be?"	Together with your child pour ¼ cup of sugar in a bowl. Add two cups of water to it and mix well. Then add ¼ of dish soap and mix gently. To make a bubble wand use a chopstick or a small stick you may have laying around and a pipe cleaner. Then make a circle out of the pipe cleaner and tape it to the tip of the stick.	1-5 or 1-10. Place all the cups on a flat surface and have your child begin stacking them.

Once it's dry peel off the tape. 	 Toy animals (5 to 10 or toys that are available at home) Directions: Invite whole family playing this game. Ask your child to hide the toy first and you looked for it or vice versa (o r their siblings to hide it and help your child to find it). Ask for clues or give some clues, to assist your children to find the item (e.g., look under the). 	 Tape (any available tape) Scissor Can be done on the hardwood, laminate or carpet. You can also use a cardboard or paper (encourage children to write letters, numbers on paper) If you want to play in the backyard use chalk or washable paint. Directions: Use tape and create your pattern. Make four squares and a triangle on top. Encourage older children to create their pattern. Ask children to draw, write letters and numbers. Invite your family to play the game.
